

Freedom of Speech

On Monday evening at the VFW in Dilworth, a friend and I were talking about the controversy over a football player not standing for playing of our National Anthem. After some discussion we agreed the event is an example of what is contained in the first Article or Amendment to our Constitution. As proposed in 1789 and ratified by three-fourths of the state legislatures on December 15, 1791, "Congress shall make no law respecting an establishment of religion, or prohibiting the free exercise thereof; or abridging the freedom of speech, or of the press; or the right of the people peaceably to assemble, and to petition the Government for a redress of grievances." Two questions can be asked; was he right and did he have the right. The answer to the first is what is being debated. The answer to the second is yes, he had the right to the freedom of speech. I am reminded of a speech from the movie *The American President*. I know it's a romantic comedy but it has a couple moments worth remembering. Here is what President Andrew Sheperd, played by Michael Douglas said "You want free speech? Let's see you acknowledge a man whose words make your blood boil, who's standing center stage and advocating at the top of his lungs that which you would spend a lifetime opposing at the top of yours" Yes, I stand for the National Anthem, I stand as the flag passes by in a parade, I respect both as symbols of our great nation. However, I also know that forced respect is the same as no respect. I believe he was wrong for not standing. I also strongly believe he had the right to not stand.
